The Logan-Cache Airport Authority Board convened in a regular session on March 1, 2018 at 8:30 a.m. in the Cache County Historic Courthouse, County Council Chambers, 199 North Main, Logan, Utah.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman John Kerr called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

ITEMS OF BUSINESS

Approval of Minutes – January 4, 2018

ACTION: Motion was made by Ward and seconded by Simmonds to approve the minutes of January 4, 2018 as written. The vote in favor was unanimous, 6-0; Walton absent for vote

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

Manager's Report – Lee Ivie (Attachment A) Lee Ivie presented the Manager Report which is part of these minutes as Attachment A.

During his report on vehicle maintenance, Buttars asked Ivie if the cost of repairs is getting to be more than the cost of purchasing a new vehicle. Ivie said that there are some years where the repairs can run \$25,000 to \$30,000 at the end of the season. Buttars suggested looking at leasing vehicles with a trade-in option as a way to save money. The board agreed it would be worth looking into. Ivie said he looks to purchase equipment from Logan City or other airports and it saves the airport a lot of money as opposed to purchasing it new. He is looking right now to find a sweeper for the airport.

Airport Improvements Update – Cole Miller (Attachment B)

Miller distributed a handout listing current and future improvement projects for the airport. It is a part of these minutes as Attachment B. He then spent some time reviewing the list with the Board.

USU 5K Run – Brandon Parish

Parish said that the date has been set for August 18, 2018. Ivie said there needs to be a legitimate reason to shut down Runway 10/28. In the past, they have linked ongoing construction with the run in order to be able to close the runway but this year, there will be no concurrent construction. It was suggested that there could be an inspection scheduled for the same day that could be put in the NOTAM.

Daines asked what the purpose of the 5K Run is. Kerr responded that it is a good fundraiser for the USU Aviation Program to compete in Aeronautics competitions throughout the western United States. It does bring in a significant amount of revenue for USU and participation has increased each year since it began.

ACTION: Motion was made by Simmonds and seconded by Ward to approve the 5K Run fundraising event on August 18, 2018 for the USU Aviation Program. The vote in favor was unanimous, 6-0; Walton absent for vote

Hangar Request: F&G – Ed Kalbach (Attachment C)

Kerr said the requested hangar is adjacent to the Spindler hangar and the size will be 50' x 60'. A drawing of the requested hangar is included in these minutes as Attachment C.

Ivie noted that the hangar space will be F-15 and it will face east.

ACTION: Motion was made by Daines and seconded by Ward to approve the request by Ed Kalbach for space F-15 for construction of a hangar of 50' x up to 60'. The vote in favor was unanimous, 6-0; Walton absent for vote

Kerr stated that in the last couple of months, Mr. Malouf purchased all of Robert Harris' airport assets.

Request from Cache Archers – Monte Clark

Clark requested to use the abandoned runway with access from the west entrance for an archery competition in May. The proposed dates for the event are May 11-13, 2018. Bill Francis volunteered to be there during the event to provide security.

Daines asked if the airport charges groups for the use of the airport for events like this. Ivie said it depends on the group. Non-profit organizations aren't charged anything, but for-profit organizations pay \$100/day for use of the abandoned runway.

Simmonds asked why they wanted to have the event at the airport. Clark responded that it provides a lot of space away from populated places. He estimated there will be 100-200 participants with an additional staff of 20 people to run the event.

ACTION: Motion was made by Simmonds and seconded by Buttars to approve the Cache Archery Shoot event to be held May 11-13, 2018. The vote in favor was unanimous, 6-0; Walton absent for vote

Francis said that Ed Fisher has requested approval from the Airport Authority Board to host the Aggie Auction at his hangar again this year.

ACTION: Motion was made by Francis and seconded by Buttars to approve the Aggie Auction event to be held at the Ed Fisher hangar. The vote in favor was unanimous, 6-0; Walton absent for vote

2017 Corporate Flight Activity – Bill Francis (Attachment D)

Francis showed a Powerpoint presentation which is part of these minutes as Attachment D. According to the IFR graph on page 3 of the presentation, the Logan-Cache Airport handles around 10,000 people every year.

Kerr noted that the airport is averaging 3-4 corporate aircraft coming in every day. Board members discussed the growth of the airport. Hall said they are working with Avis to arrange for a rental car facility at the airport. He would really like to see the CVTD make the airport a stop on one of their routes.

Committee Reports:

Audit & Finance – Craig Buttars

Buttars made the Board aware that he had the budget balance sheet if any of them were interested in looking at it. The current fund balance is \$158,600. Kerr noted that an additional \$360,000 will be coming in the next two years as federal reimbursement for improvement projects.

He noted that a scheduled runway upgrade is coming in five years at a cost of

approximately \$500,000. The airport will not have that much in its reserve budget to meet that amount so Kerr asked the County and Logan City to be aware of it and consider upping their contributions to the airport in order to have enough in the budget for the project.

Operations Committee – Kim Hall

Hall said the Operations Committee has not met for about six months, but will start meeting again on a regular basis.

Capital Improvements - Bill Francis

No report

Economic Development / Public Relations – Gar Walton

Kerr said Gar Walton received an invitation from the Kiwanis Club to do a dinner presentation in May.

Open Items

• Ivie reported that the airport had received a notice from the Cache County Weed Department informing him that the airport is one of the regions with a noxious weed problem, particularly with Goatsrue, a weed toxic to livestock. He continued that an area of the airport was used during a three-year study by Utah State University testing different chemicals and herbicides in an effort to eradicate the weed. The herbicide worked well initially, but the goatsrue is starting to come back now. The County Weed Department will spray again, but will charge to do it. He asked the Board for approval to allow the Weed Department to spray because it is not included in the budget.

Francis said it might be possible to get a state grant to pay for the spraying since it is classified as a noxious weed.

Daines asked what the charge will be. Buttars responded by saying he sits on the Cache County Weed Board and the charge is \$50 / acre. Ivie said there are an estimated 700 acres at the airport, but they will probably isolate and spray just the problem areas.

Ivie said he has already ordered the herbicide to spray the airport this year and increased the amount to allow for a third spraying rather than the two he normally does.

ACTION: Motion was made by Ward and seconded by Daines to amend the budget by moving funds from the reserve budget to the operating budget in order to accommodate for the spraying by the Cache County Weed Department for Goatsrue. The vote in favor was unanimous, 6-0; Walton absent for vote

• Simmonds said she attended a Logan City Planning Commission a few weeks ago where there was a request to rezone part of the airport overlay zone to accommodate the construction of some storage units on property just off of 6th West. No one from the airport

was there. Kerr said the FAA finds the construction of storage units to be the least offensive of any development affecting the overlay zone.

There was some additional discussion about the protected and extended protection overlay zone at this point with Kerr concluding that the FAA considers anything outside of this area as developable. However, land from 2300 North up to the airport falls in the protected overlay zone and is not developable.

February 2018 Manager's Report

1. <u>Current AIP Projects.</u>

- **a.** Taxiway I: The application for a grant to cover ninety percent of the costs for phase one of this project has been submitted to the Denver District Office. At this juncture it is not known if the FAA will fund their entire amount of eligible costs in 2018. The reimbursable amount may have to be covered in two separate years.
- b. <u>Construction of Hangar J-5:</u> All of the concrete work has been completed, and the main frame of the building has been erected.
- c. **<u>EPS Project</u>**: This project is still in the early phase of construction consisting of concrete work.

2. Buildings, Grounds, and Vehicle Maintenance.

- a. Repairs to the power steering unit on the Ford Plow Truck are needed.
- b. One of the hydraulic rams on the snowplow that is mounted to the Autocar Truck will have to have seals replaced. I'm hoping to postpone this repair item until the winter season is finished.
- c. The GMC pick-up is starting to have some noise that probably is related to the rear differential or possibly the universal joints. I'll need to have a mechanic look at this issue.

3. Based Aircraft Report.

The State Department of Aeronautics hired a company last year named Blackbox Enterprise Solutions to tract registered aircraft in Utah. I've met with associates of that company to discuss the method of providing information to them as it relates to aircraft based at our airport. It was determined that the best way to do this was to use the current FAA website <u>BasedAircraft.com</u>. Twice a year I update the information for LGU, and February is the first time in 2018 for making these updates. The data below reflect the findings of those entries.

- a. Total aircraft at LGU entered into the system -176
- b. Number of those aircraft currently registered 169
- c. Number of those aircraft currently validated 158
- d. Type of validated aircraft at LGU single engine 128 multiple engine 13 jet 7 helicopter 10
- e. 3 gliders based at our field were entered to the system but were not registered, and the non-validated aircraft entered into our report were reported as being based at other airports.

4. Winter Operations.

The snow removal operations crew was mobilized three times in February.








Logan – Cache Airport helps businesses succeed in Cache Valley.

Corporate aircraft make businesses more efficient and effective.


- Corporate representatives might visit four to five destinations in one day using a private aircraft when commercial travel would limit them to one.

- Corporate aircraft can be owned, leased, shareowned, or chartered.

Total IFR Operations: Operations to and from Logan Cache Airport that are filed with Flight Services under Instrument Flight Rules. Most local flights, including training flights, are VFR – visual flight rules – so are not filed with Flight following.

Some IFR flights block the aircraft N-number so that their information is confidential.

Fuel sales roughly follow the IFR activity, although some IFR aircraft don't purchase fuel. Local fuel sales continue to increase – but these sales are not usually related to IFR flights.
