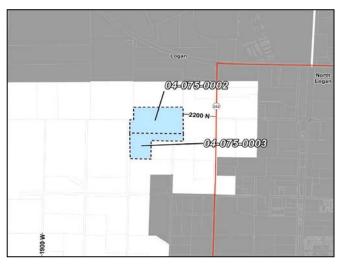

Findings of Fact

A. Request description

- 1. A request to rezone approximately 45 acres from the Agricultural (A10) Zone to the Industrial (I) Zone.
- 2. This rezone may allow the parcel to establish uses permitted in the Industrial (I) Zone. A rezone request is general in nature and is not tied to any proposed use. Any impacts related to permitted and conditional uses allowed within the Industrial Zone will be addressed as part of each respective approval process required prior to site development activities.
- 3. Staff has identified general information as pertains to the subject property to assist the Planning Commission and County Council in arriving at a decision. This information is reflected in the attached maps (Attachment A, B, & C) and in the following text:

a. Land Use Context:

- i. Parcel status: The subject properties are legal as they are in the same size and configuration since August 8, 2006. Research from the County's GIS Department indicates that, according to the legal description and plat that there are significance discrepancies on the acreage. Property descriptions appear to be lot and block based, and there appear to be road right-of-way gaps that likely should appear on the property, but currently do not. Further research and a survey is required to determine the actual acreage of the properties and if any road rights-of-way are present prior to any possible rezone of the property.
- ii. The Industrial (I) Zone allows for a variety of uses with the approval of a zoning clearance and/or conditional use permit, including the following uses, that are not permitted in the current Agricultural (A10) Zone:
 - General Manufacturing
 - Storage and Warehousing
 - Transport Services
 - Sexually-oriented Businesses
 - Crematorium
 - Commercial Kennels/Animal Shelters
- iii. Sensitive Areas: The subject property contains sensitive areas that may impact future development (Attachment B).
 - The County GIS data indicates that a number of potential wetlands, water bodies, and irrigation canals are located on the subject properties.
 - The properties are also located in the vicinity of the Airport Traffic Pattern Zone and Airport Influence Area.
- iv. Adjacent uses: The properties adjacent to the subject rezone are primarily agricultural and industrial (Attachment A). There no parcels with a home within a ½ mile of the subject properties. Logan City boundaries are within ¼ mile of the subject properties to the north, south, and east.
 - There are 3 parcels zoned Industrial (I) to the east of the rezone request. All three parcels were rezoned in 2011 as Ordinance 2011-07. Edge Excavation operates a material storage facility on the parcel (04-076-0008) immediately adjacent to the subject properties. There are no current, approved CUPs for parcels 04-066-0009, and 04-076-0008.
- v. Annexation Areas: The subject property is located within the Logan City Future Annexation Area (Attachment C). In reiewing the map for Logan City's Annexation Policy Plan Boundaries, the subject properties appears to be split between planned land uses for Urban Service Areas (USA) and Resource Conservation Areas (RCA).

B. Ordinance—§12.02.010, §17.02.060; §17.08.030 [C]

- **4.** As per §17.02.060, Establishment of Land Use Authority, the County Council is authorized to act as the Land Use Authority for this application.
- 5. The current County Land Use Ordinance does not specify appropriate locations for the Industrial (I) Zone but does contain general guidelines for its implementation. County Land Use Ordinance §17.08.030 [F] identifies the purpose of the Industrial Zone and includes the following:
 - **a.** "To provide locations where manufacturing, processing, warehousing, and fabrication of goods and material can be carried on with minimum conflict or deleterious effect upon the surrounding properties. The purpose of this zone is also to promote the economic well-being of the citizens and to broaden the tax base.

- **b.** This zone must be appropriately served by suitable public roads, have access to the necessary water and utilities, and have adequate provision of public services."
- **6.** Any impacts related to permitted and conditional uses allowed within the Industrial (I) Zone will be addressed as part of each respective approval process required prior to site development activities.

C. Access—16.04.040 [A], 16.04.080 [E], Road Manual

- 7. §12.02.010 adopts the Manual of Roadway Design and Construction Standards (Road Manual) for roadway improvement requirements.
- **8.** The Road Manual specifies the following:
 - a. §2.1 Roadway Functional Classification Major Local Road (ML): Major Local roads serve a dual function of providing access to properties that abut the road as well as providing a through or connection service between higher road classification facilities. Major local roads may have significant local continuity and may operate at relatively high speeds. Because of the possibility of through traffic, a meaningful segment of traffic on major local roads may include drivers who are unfamiliar with the roads. Traffic on major local roads is largely composed of passenger vehicles or other smaller vehicle types. Where a significant proportion of traffic is trucks or other heavy vehicles, additional design considerations will be required.
 - **b.** Table B-6 Typical Cross Section Minimum Standards: Major local roads must meet the minimum standard of a 66-foot right-of-way, two 10-foot wide paved travel lanes with 6-foot wide shoulders (2 feet paved and 4 feet of gravel): 14-inches depth of granular borrow, a 6-inches depth of untreated base course, and 3 inches of bituminous surface course (asphalt).
- 9. A basic review of the access to the subject property identifies the following:
 - **a.** Parcel 04-075-0002 has access to 2200 North, a County road classified as a Major Local Road.
 - **b.** Parcel 04-075-0003 has no access to a County road.
 - c. 2200 North has direct access to SR 242 (1000 West), a UDOT facility.
 - **d.** A portion of 2200 North has been paved and improved to provide access to the Edge Excavation material storage facility. The remainder of the road is a two-track dirt road that provides access to agricultural uses.
 - e. The paved portion of 2200 North is in good condition and has a 24-foot width.
 - **f.** The County does not provide maintenance on 2200 North.

D. Service Provisions:

- **10.** §16.04.080 [C] Fire Control The County Fire District visited the site and had no comments regarding the rezone request. Any potential future development will be reviewed and may require improvements depending on location and size. Plans must be submitted to the Fire Department for review and approval prior to construction.
- **11.** §16.04.080 [F] Solid Waste Disposal Logan City Environmental had no comments on the rezone request.

E. Public Notice and Comment—§17.02.040 Notice of Meetings

- 12. Public notice was posted online to the Utah Public Notice Website on 23 April 2021.
- **13.** Notice was published in the Herald Journal on 27 April 2021.
- 14. Notices were posted in three public places on 23 April 2021.
- 15. Notices were mailed to all property owners within 300 feet and Logan City on 23 April 2021.
- **16.** At this time, no written public comment regarding this proposal has been received by the Development Services Office.

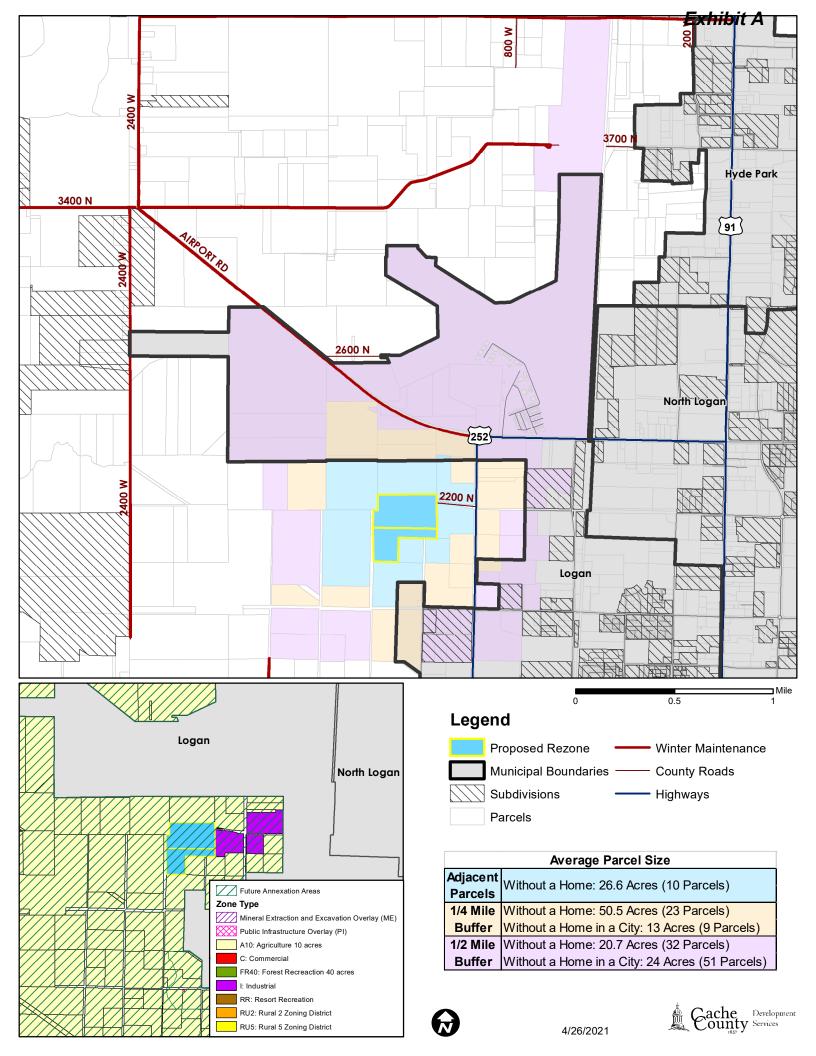

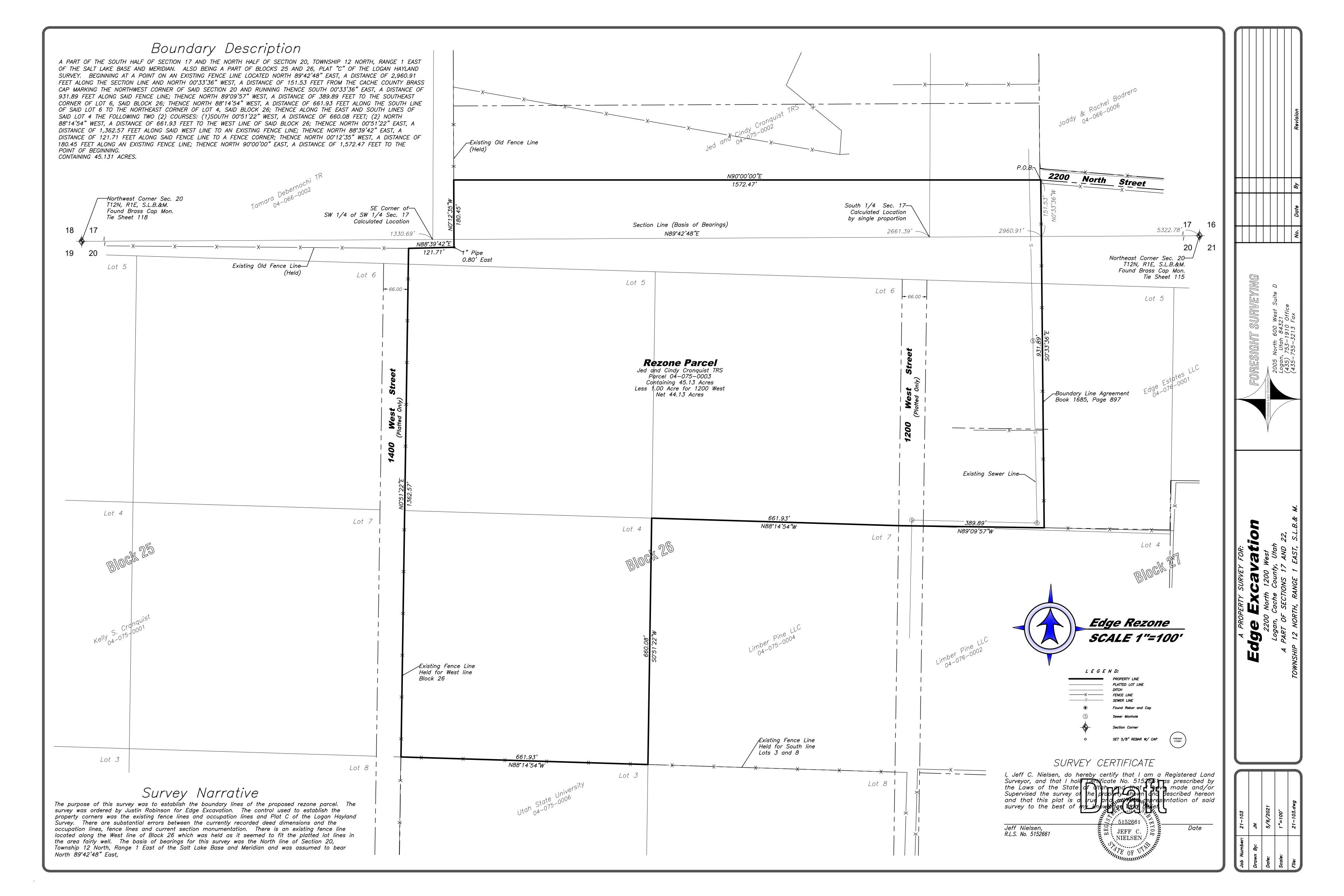
Planning Commission Conclusion

Ordinance No. 2021-16 Cache County, Utah

West Edge Rezone

An ordinance request to amend the County Zoning Map by rezoning 45 acres from the Agricultural (A10) Zone to the Industrial (I) Zone

Whereas, the "County Land Use Development and Management Act," Utah Code Ann. §17-27a-101 et seq., as amended (the "Act"), provides that each county may enact a land use ordinance and a zoning map establishing regulations for land use and development; and

Whereas, pursuant to the Act, the County's Planning Commission (the "Planning Commission") shall prepare and recommend to the county's legislative body, following a public hearing, a proposed land use ordinance and a zoning map, or amendments thereto, that represent the Planning Commission's recommendations for zoning the area within the county; and

Whereas, the Planning Commission caused notice of a public hearing for the rezone to be advertised at least ten (10) days before the date of the public hearing in *The Herald Journal*, a newspaper of general circulation in Cache County; and

Whereas, on May 6, 2021, the Planning Commission held a public hearing, accepted all comments, and recommended the approval of the proposed amendments to the County Council for final action; and

Whereas, the Act also provides certain procedures for the county legislative body to adopt or reject amendments to the land use ordinance and zoning map for the county; and

Whereas, following proper notice, the County Council held a public hearing on June 8, 2021, to consider any comments regarding the proposed rezone. The County Council accepted all comments; and

Whereas, the Cache County Council has determined that it is both necessary and appropriate for the County to amend and implement this ordinance.

Now, therefore, the County Legislative Body of Cache County ordains as follows:

1. Statutory Authority

The statutory authority for enacting this ordinance is Utah Code Annotated Sections 17-27a Part 1 and Part 3, and 17-53 part 2(1953, as amended to date).

2. Adoption of amended Zoning Map

The County Council hereby amends the County's Zoning Map to reflect the rezone of the property affected by this ordinance and hereby adopts the amended Zoning Map with

the amendment identified as Exhibit B, of which a detailed digital or paper copy is available in the Development Services Department.

3. Conclusions

- A. The location of the subject property is compatible with the purpose of the Industrial (I) Zone as identified under §17.08.030[F] of the Cache County Code as it:
 - **a.** Allows for industrial development in an area with minimal residential development, which may limit conflict or deleterious effects upon surrounding properties.

4. Prior ordinances, resolutions, policies, and actions superseded

This ordinance amends and supersedes the Zoning Map of Cache County, and all prior ordinances, resolutions, policies, and actions of the Cache County Council to the extent that the provisions of such prior ordinances, resolutions, policies, or actions are in conflict with this ordinance. Following its passage but prior to the effective date, a copy of the ordinance shall be deposited with the County Clerk and a short summary of the ordinance shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the County as required by law.

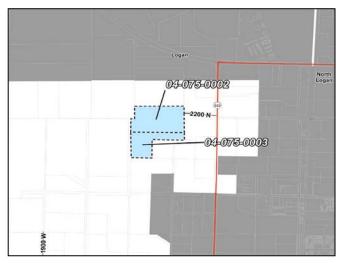

Findings of Fact

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6 May 2021 1 of 4

a. Land Use Context:

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 - Sexually-oriented Businesses
 - Crematorium
 - Commercial Kennels/Animal Shelters
- iii. Sensitive Areas: The subject property contains sensitive areas that may impact future development (Attachment B).
 - The County GIS data indicates that a number of potential wetlands, water bodies, and irrigation canals are located on the subject properties.
 - The properties are also located in the vicinity of the Airport Traffic Pattern Zone and Airport Influence Area.
- iv. Adjacent uses: The properties adjacent to the subject rezone are primarily agricultural and industrial (Attachment A). There no parcels with a home within a ½ mile of the subject properties. Logan City boundaries are within ¼ mile of the subject properties to the north, south, and east.
 - There are 3 parcels zoned Industrial (I) to the east of the rezone request. All three parcels were rezoned in 2011 as Ordinance 2011-07. Edge Excavation operates a material storage facility on the parcel (04-076-0008) immediately adjacent to the subject properties. There are no current, approved CUPs for parcels 04-066-0009, and 04-076-0008.
- v. Annexation Areas: The subject property is located within the Logan City Future Annexation Area (Attachment C). In reiewing the map for Logan City's Annexation Policy Plan Boundaries, the subject properties appears to be split between planned land uses for Urban Service Areas (USA) and Resource Conservation Areas (RCA).

B. Ordinance—§12.02.010, §17.02.060; §17.08.030 [C]

- **4.** As per §17.02.060, Establishment of Land Use Authority, the County Council is authorized to act as the Land Use Authority for this application.
- 5. The current County Land Use Ordinance does not specify appropriate locations for the Industrial (I) Zone but does contain general guidelines for its implementation. County Land Use Ordinance §17.08.030 [F] identifies the purpose of the Industrial Zone and includes the following:
 - **a.** "To provide locations where manufacturing, processing, warehousing, and fabrication of goods and material can be carried on with minimum conflict or deleterious effect upon the surrounding properties. The purpose of this zone is also to promote the economic well-being of the citizens and to broaden the tax base.

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- **b.** This zone must be appropriately served by suitable public roads, have access to the necessary water and utilities, and have adequate provision of public services."
- **6.** Any impacts related to permitted and conditional uses allowed within the Industrial (I) Zone will be addressed as part of each respective approval process required prior to site development activities.

C. Access—16.04.040 [A], 16.04.080 [E], Road Manual

- 7. §12.02.010 adopts the Manual of Roadway Design and Construction Standards (Road Manual) for roadway improvement requirements.
- **8.** The Road Manual specifies the following:
 - a. §2.1 Roadway Functional Classification Major Local Road (ML): Major Local roads serve a dual function of providing access to properties that abut the road as well as providing a through or connection service between higher road classification facilities. Major local roads may have significant local continuity and may operate at relatively high speeds. Because of the possibility of through traffic, a meaningful segment of traffic on major local roads may include drivers who are unfamiliar with the roads. Traffic on major local roads is largely composed of passenger vehicles or other smaller vehicle types. Where a significant proportion of traffic is trucks or other heavy vehicles, additional design considerations will be required.
 - **b.** Table B-6 Typical Cross Section Minimum Standards: Major local roads must meet the minimum standard of a 66-foot right-of-way, two 10-foot wide paved travel lanes with 6-foot wide shoulders (2 feet paved and 4 feet of gravel): 14-inches depth of granular borrow, a 6-inches depth of untreated base course, and 3 inches of bituminous surface course (asphalt).
- **9.** A basic review of the access to the subject property identifies the following:
 - **a.** Parcel 04-075-0002 has access to 2200 North, a County road classified as a Major Local Road.
 - **b.** Parcel 04-075-0003 has no access to a County road.
 - c. 2200 North has direct access to SR 242 (1000 West), a UDOT facility.
 - **d.** A portion of 2200 North has been paved and improved to provide access to the Edge Excavation material storage facility. The remainder of the road is a two-track dirt road that provides access to agricultural uses.
 - e. The paved portion of 2200 North is in good condition and has a 24-foot width.
 - **f.** The County does not provide maintenance on 2200 North.

D. Service Provisions:

- **10.** §16.04.080 [C] Fire Control The County Fire District visited the site and had no comments regarding the rezone request. Any potential future development will be reviewed and may require improvements depending on location and size. Plans must be submitted to the Fire Department for review and approval prior to construction.
- **11.** §16.04.080 [F] Solid Waste Disposal Logan City Environmental had no comments on the rezone request.

E. Public Notice and Comment—§17.02.040 Notice of Meetings

- 12. Public notice was posted online to the Utah Public Notice Website on 23 April 2021.
- **13.** Notice was published in the Herald Journal on 27 April 2021.
- **14.** Notices were posted in three public places on 23 April 2021.
- 15. Notices were mailed to all property owners within 300 feet and Logan City on 23 April 2021.
- **16.** At this time, no written public comment regarding this proposal has been received by the Development Services Office.

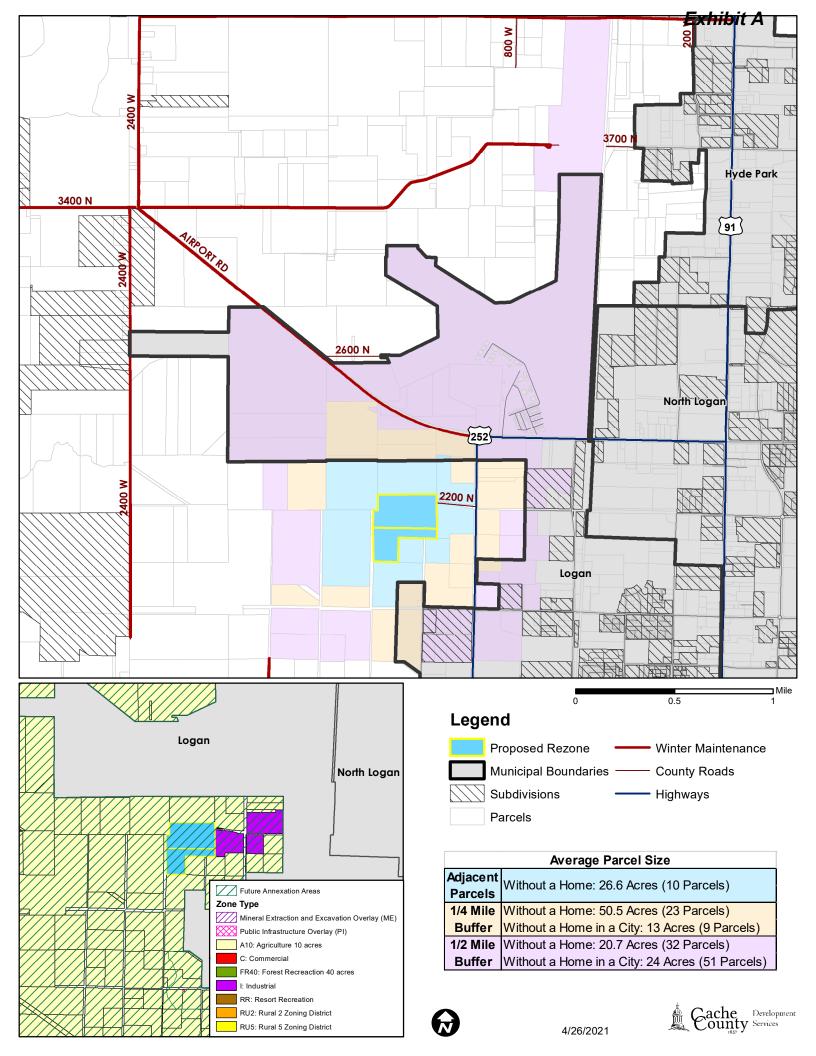

Planning Commission Conclusion

- 1. The location of the subject property is compatible with the purpose of the Industrial (I) Zone as identified under §17.08.030[F] of the Cache County Code as it:
 - **a.** Allows for industrial development in an area with minimal residential development, which may limit conflict or deleterious effects upon surrounding properties.

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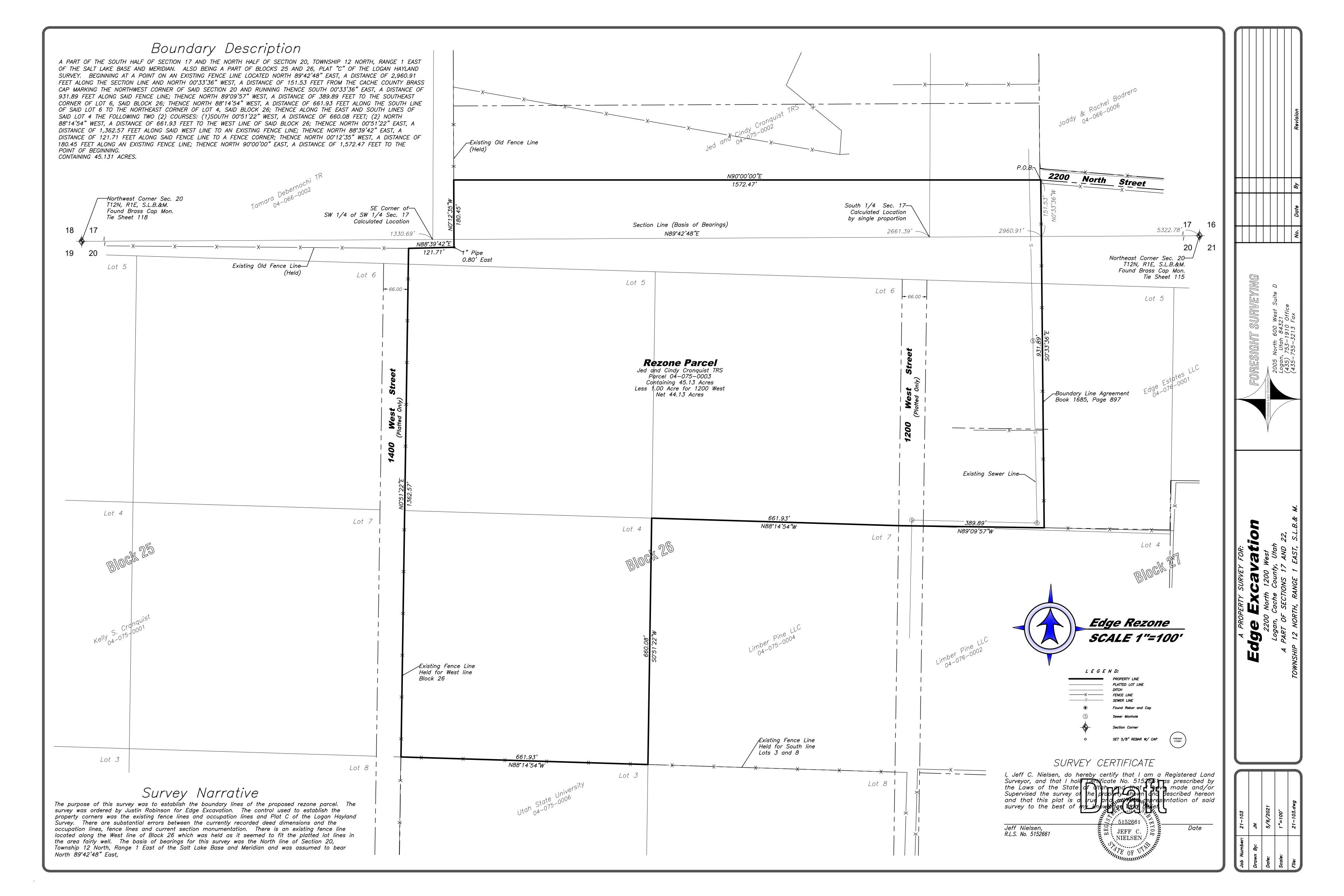
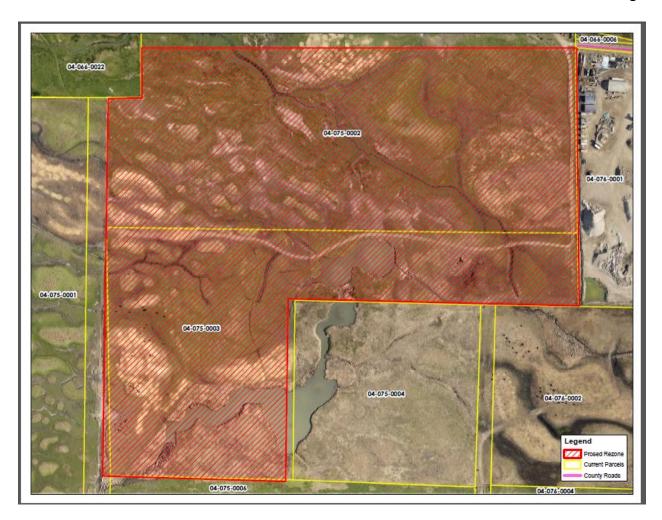


Exhibit B: Ordinance 2021-16

AA. Domestic Violence, Sexual Violence, and Stalking

1. Purpose

This policy is part of Cache County's commitment to a safe and supportive organizational climate and to the prevention and reduction of the occurrence and effects of workplace-related incidents of sexual misconduct, domestic violence, and dating violence (hereinafter "violence"). Violence can be workplace-related even if incidents occur elsewhere. Cache County recognizes that violence presents unique issues for its employees, volunteers, consultants, and contractors (hereinafter "workers").

The purposes and goals of this policy are to:

- institutionalize responsive policies and procedures to assist and support workers who are impacted by violence;
- discipline and hold accountable workers who use violence, which in certain cases may include such assistive and supportive measures as requiring counseling; and
- assure that workers who use violence are prohibited from occupying positions that could undermine Cache County's ability to carry out federal Office on Violence Against Women grantfunded projects.

2. Definitions

The following terms have the indicated meanings for purposes of this Subsection AA:

- "Adjudication" includes a conviction or issuance of a final protection order, stalking injunction, court-ordered diversion, or other judicial finding that the employee, volunteer, consultant, or contractor has engaged in domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking.
- "Domestic violence," "dating violence," "sexual assault," and "stalking" have the meanings given in 34 U.S.C. § 12291(a).
- "Sexual misconduct" means sexual assault, stalking, and sexual harassment.
- "Sexual harassment" means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when this conduct explicitly or implicitly affects an individual's employment, unreasonably interferes with an individual's work performance, or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment, whether such activity is carried out by a supervisor or by a co-worker, volunteer, or contractor.
- An individual is considered to be in the "workplace" of Cache County while in, or using the resources of, Cache County's offices or facilities, using its equipment or vehicles, engaging in approved telework, on work-related travel, or otherwise conducting business on behalf of Cache County. The availability and nature of the response to a workplace-related incident may depend on the location at issue.

"Workplace-related incidents" of sexual misconduct, domestic violence, and dating violence
include acts, attempted acts, or threatened acts by or against employees, consultants,
volunteers, or contractors, that occur in the workplace or that occur outside the workplace but
have an impact on the workplace or otherwise undermine the ability of Cache County to carry
out federal Office on Violence Against Women grant-funded projects.

3. Persons Covered by this Policy

Persons covered by this policy include full and part-time employees, volunteers, consultants, and contractors engaged by - or in any location or event controlled or sanctioned by - Cache County.

4. Statement of Confidentiality

Cache County recognizes and respects a worker's right to privacy and the need for confidentiality and autonomy. Cache County will maintain the confidentiality of a worker's disclosure regarding violence to the extent allowed by law, and unless to do so would result in physical harm to any person and/or jeopardize safety within any location or event controlled by Cache County.

When information must be disclosed to protect the safety of individuals within any location or event controlled by Cache County, Cache County will limit the breadth and content of such disclosure to information reasonably necessary to protect the safety of the disclosing workers and others, and to comply with the law. Cache County will provide advance notice to the worker who disclosed information, to the extent possible, if the disclosure must be shared with other parties in order to maintain safety in any location or event controlled by Cache County or elsewhere.

Cache County will also provide the worker with the name and title of the person to whom Cache County intends to share the worker's statements and will explain the necessity and purpose of the disclosure.

5. Responses to Violence

A. Reporting by Workers with Information About Violence:

Workers who have information about or witness an act of violence perpetrated by another worker, or who have information about or witness violence against a worker, are encouraged to report this information to the Director of Human Resources.

Supervisors who have information about or witness an act of violence perpetrated by another worker or supervisor, or who have information about or witness violence against a worker or supervisor, are required to report this information to the Director of Human Resources.

B. Responses to Workers Accused of Using Violence

If Cache County receives information that alleges or suggests that a worker has committed an incident of workplace-related violence, or if any manager or supervisor receives information that any worker has engaged in any incident of workplace-related violence, then the matter must be referred to the Director of Human Resources for the purpose of investigating the information or allegation. The Director of Human Resources, with the aid, if needed, of the County Attorney's Office, will conduct a timely investigation of the information or allegation, which investigation must be completed within 45 days of receipt of the information or allegation concerning the alleged incident of violence.

Every worker has a duty to cooperate with such an investigation and failure to do so will result in disciplinary action against the uncooperative worker up to and including termination or severance of a contractual relationship. Additionally, every worker has the duty to be truthful and must disclose all relevant information known to the worker when requested to do so by any person designated by Cache County to investigate an alleged incident of violence. Any worker who fails to be completely truthful or who withholds information will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination or severance of a contractual relationship.

At the conclusion of an investigation described herein, the Director of Human Resources will report his or her findings to the County Executive. If the Director of Human Resources concludes, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the worker has engaged in a workplace-related incident of sexual misconduct, domestic violence, or dating violence, then that worker will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination or severance of a contractual relationship. The worker might also be required to participate in counseling or other remedial measures.

A worker who is subject to an adjudication, as defined in this Subsection AA, must notify the Director of Human Resources immediately regarding the existence of the adjudication. Failure to disclose the adjudication may result in disciplinary action, up to and including termination from employment or severance of a contractual relationship.

C. Responses to Workers Who Are Found to Have Used Violence

In the event that the Director of Human Resources reports that the worker has engaged in a workplace-related incident of sexual misconduct, domestic violence, or dating violence, or the worker has been found guilty or liable in a criminal or civil action arising from a threat or act of violence, as defined in this Subsection AA, the County Executive will determine whether a continued employment, contractual, or volunteer relationship with the worker would undermine Cache County's ability to carry out federal Office on Violence Against Women ("OVW") grant-funded projects. If the County Executive determines that a continued employment, contractual, or volunteer relationship with the worker would undermine Cache County's ability to carry out OVW grant-funded projects,

the County Executive will remove the worker from any position that may undermine Cache County's ability to carry out OVW grant-funded projects.

The County Executive may grant an exception and allow an employee, contractor, or volunteer who was previously found to have used violence by any jurisdiction or previous employer or contractee to occupy a position that could otherwise undermine the ability of Cache County to carry out the OVW funded project, so long as the County Executive can establish to that the worker has met the following qualifications:

- no survivor of violence used by the worker, nor any family member or friend of a survivor of violence used by the worker, will encounter the worker in any Cache County-controlled capacity;
- the worker evidences accountability, restoration, and rehabilitation;
- and the mission of the OVW grant-funded project would benefit from the worker's experience.

All terminations of an employment or contractual relationship with a worker pursuant to this provision, as well as any exception granted pursuant to this provision (including the standards Cache County relied upon in granting an exception), must be reported to OVW.

6. Reporting by Workers Who Are Victims/Survivors

Workers who are surviving violence, and workers who are concerned about coworkers who might be victims, are encouraged to provide a report to Cache County. Cache County has designated the Director of Human Resources or any supervisor as persons to whom such reports should be made. The Director of Human Resources will provide community referrals and resources in order to assist workers with their experiences and concerns.

7. Reporting Violation of Policy

A person who wishes to report a violation of this policy should also contact the Director of Human Resources or any supervisor. Cache County prohibits retaliation against any person who makes a report under this policy.

CACHE COUNTY RESOLUTION 2021-15

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A REVISED CACHE COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS RATE SCHEDULE

WHEREAS, the County Council of Cache County, Utah, in regular meeting, lawful notice of which has been given, finds that it is appropriate and necessary that Cache County adopt a revised rate schedule for building and equipment use at the Cache County Fairgrounds;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Council as follows:

Section 1: Rate Schedule.

The Cache County Council hereby approves the Cache County Fairgrounds Rate Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit A. The Cache County Council further approves and authorizes the Cache County Executive to negotiate a contract for other items of equal or greater value, as reasonably determined by the County Executive, in lieu of the designated dollar amounts set forth in the Fairgrounds Rate Schedule.

This rate schedule supersedes all prior rate schedules for the Cache County Fairgrounds and associated facilities referenced in this resolution and the attached rate schedule.

Section 2: Effective Date

This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption.
