October 24, 1995

The Cache County Council met in regular session on the 24th day of October, 1995 in the County Council Chambers located at 120 North 100 West, Logan, Utah 84321.

ATTENDANCE

Erickson; Cache County Attorney Scott Wyatt; Cache County Auditor Tamra Stones; Cache County Planning and Zoning Administrator Lorene Greenhalgh; Cache County Road Superintendent Joe Kirby; Cache County School District Superintendent Larry Jensen; Cache/Rich Tourist Council Director Maridene Alexander; Festival of the American West Director Ron Call; Representatives of the local news media and other interested citizens.

CALL TO ORDER

Council Chairman Sarah Ann Skanchy called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. and welcomed all who were in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was given by Vice Chairman C. Larry Anhder.

AGENDA & MINUTES

The agenda for the meeting was approved.

The minutes of the regular council meeting held on October 14, 1995 and sent to all members of the Council were corrected and approved.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE

The County Executive M. Lynn Lemon reported on the following items:

A motion to approve the above 9 appointments was made by Councilman Allen. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

2. County-Wide Planning Committee Assignments: Mark Teuscher the County-Wide Planner appeared before the Council to discuss different areas of planning and the organization of Committees in those areas. Teuscher asked Council members to serve on the various committees as vice chairmen. Council members volunteered as follows:

The committee work is expected to be completed at the end of March 1996.

Teuscher invited the Council to attend a Cache County meeting on growth. The meeting will be on November 4 at 9:30 at B.A.T.C..

- 3. Substance Abuse: There is interest among counties to combine agencies that deal with substance abuse. Meetings with the Substance Abuse Advisory Board are being held to discuss options concerning the proposal.
- 4. Warrants: The warrants were presented to the Clerk for filing.

CACHE COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT BONDING: SUPERINTENDENT JENSEN, LARRY

The Cache County School District Superintendent Larry Jensen reviewed with the Council an up coming bond election in the county that will, if passed authorize the County School Board to issue bonds totaling \$16 million in general obligation bonds.

Jensen explained the needs of the District and the importance of passing the bond election. Jensen was invited to attend the County Board of Equalization next fall if the bond is passed.

PUBLIC HEARING: BUDGET OPENING-1995-TAMRA STONES

Chairman Skanchy convened a Public Hearing at 5:30 p.m. to receive input on proposed adjustments to the 1995 General Budget. County Auditor Tamra Stones was asked to review the proposed adjustments in revenue and expenditures to the 1995 budget. The adjustment were presented in Resolution form.

The audience was asked for comment. There was no public comment made on the proposed budget changes.

A motion to close the Public Hearing was made by Councilman Petersen. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The proposed changes to the 1995 budget were further discussed by the Council. Some figures were incorrect. Auditor Stones will make the necessary corrections.

RESOLUTION NO. 95-34: BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS-1995

A motion to adopt Resolution No. 95-34 with the needed corrections was made by Councilman Allen. It was seconded and carried unanimously. Attachment (#2) is the corrected Resolution.

INTRA-DEPARTMENTAL BUDGET TRANSFERS

The Council discussed one Intra-Department transfer that was tabled at the last Council meeting. The Sheriff is requesting a \$3,000.00 transfer.

It was moved by Councilman Allen to approve the transfer. It was properly seconded and passed on a 6 "Yes" to 1 "No" vote. Vice Chairman Anhder voted no.

CACHE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION: SENIOR CITIZEN CENTER

Chairman Skanchy reported that the Senior Citizen Center has asked the County to permit a Community Foundation to handle donations presented to them from the community.

A motion to permit the Community Foundation for the Senior Citizen Center was made by Vice Chairman Anhder. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

CACHE/RICH TOURIST COUNCIL QUARTERLY REPORT: MARIDENE ALEXANDER

Maridene Alexander, the Director of the Cache/Rich Tourist Council presented a quarterly report and a proposed 1996 budget and a revised 1995 budget.

Alexander also presented a 1996 Marketing Plan. The Plan summarized goals and strategy for marketing tourism in the area. The proposed 1996 budget was reviewed.

A motion to accept the Tourist Councils 1996 budget was made by Vice Chairman Anhder. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING: TODD MARCUS APPEAL

Executive M. Lynn Lemon convened a public hearing at 6:00 p.m. to receive public comment on an appeal by Todd Marcus. Marcus is appealing a decision made by the Planning Commission that denied his request for a conditional use permit to build a single family dwelling on his property. The Planning and Zoning Administrator Lorene Greenhalgh was asked to explain the reasons for denying the request. Greenhalgh said that the Planning Commission unanimously denied this request for many reasons. It goes against the previous zoning standards, the slope is to steep, no county services can be provided and the roads are to narrow. Point total for the requested permit was a minus 120 points.

Todd Marcus said that it isn't fair to deny him his rights because of the previous land owner. He stated that he isn't ready to build a home at the present time but is looking to do so in the future. Marcus would like the county to better service the county road leading to his property.

Justin Anderson, a local realtor, reviewed the past zoning history on the property from FR 40 to A.

There seemed to be some confusion concerning the filing of the appeal by Mr Marcus. He said that his intent is to get the road maintained better and to plan for the future for building. Marcus further stated that he didn't want to take more time in this meeting.

Lemon closed the public hearing saying that no decision on the appeal was necessary and Mr. Marcus could, if and when, he wanted

to build could start the permit process again.

TOURISM DESTINATION DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION: RON CALL

Ron Call, the Director of the Festival of the American West, appeared before the Council to ask for sponsorship of a funding proposal between Utah State University and the American West Heritage Foundation. Grant money can be obtained from the State Tourism Destination Development fund if the County Legislative Body sponsors the application. Matching funds of \$50,000 will come from USU.

Call mentioned that they will also be applying for funding from the County Restaurant Tax later on.

A motion to sponsor the application request for funding from TDD and to authorize the County Executive to sign the application on behalf of the County was made by Councilman Allen. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

RESTAURANT TAX UTILIZATION: DISCUSSION

This agenda item was tabled and will be addressed at another Council meeting.

WASTE WATER STUDY: DON HUBER

The Cache County Extension Agent Don Huber introduced to the Council Dr. Stephen E Poe USU Extension Agricultural Engineer. Dr. Poe told the Council that a Livestock Waste Effluent System is being proposed as a model for the State. They want the County to sponsor an application for funding for the project from the State Mineral Lease Funds.

It was moved by Vice Chairman Anhder to support the application. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

The formal application will be drafted and presented to the Council in a future Council meeting.

County Agent Don Huber invited Council members and the County Executive to attend a meeting to discuss Extension in the State on November 29th. A formal invitation will be sent with time and location of the meeting.

BUDGET 1996: M. LYNN LEMON

The County Executive M. Lynn Lemon and the County Auditor Tamra Stones presented to the Council their proposed 1996 budget. Lemon reported that they had met with all County Department Heads and reviewed their 1996 budget requests. Adjustments were made to their requests to balance the budget. Some Department Heads may want to visit with the Council in a budget workshop to plead their needs and proposed 1996 budgets. Lemon discussed a letter he had written to the Council containing information on the 1996 budget.

The Council will hold a budget workshop on November 14th at 4:00 p.m. to discuss the 1996 proposed budget with individual Department Heads. Department Heads were encouraged to send written information on their budget recommendations to Council members before the workshop.

ORDINANCE RECODIFYING: SCOTT WYATT

County Attorney Scott Wyatt is requesting the Councils approval to recodify or update the present County Ordinances. Wyatt suggested that it would be nice to have all the Ordinances updated and put in book form to allow easier access and to know what the Ordinance represents. The Attorneys Office will begin the task of recodifying the Ordinances and will present their recommended changes to the Council for approval.

STATE CENTENNIAL: SARAH ANN SKANCHY

Chairman Skanchy reviewed some of the State Centennial events that will happen next year (1996). The County has been asked to have 11 citizens ride the Centennial Train to SLC dressed in clothing of that period. The train ride will be on January 3rd. There will also be an event held in the Logan LDS Tabernacle on January 4th, 1996. A Wagon Train will leave the County Fairgrounds in June, 1996 to travel the State.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Councilman Allen: He reported that he had attended a Tourist Council meeting and found it very interesting.

Councilman Pulsipher: He enjoyed the USU Home Coming parade and wanted to know where more literature on the State Centennial could be obtained.

ADJOURNMENT

No further business was presented and Chairman Skanchy adjourned the meeting at 7:35 p.m..

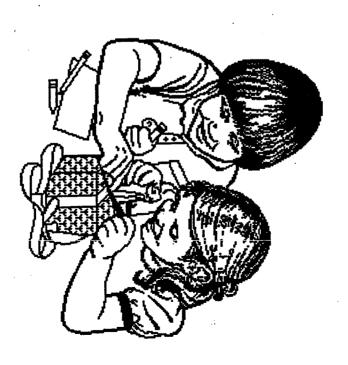

Background

Last fall, the Board of Education organized a Building Needs Committee made up of patrons and educators to identify potential building projects in the district. Their report to the Board in March of this year identified 20 such projects. 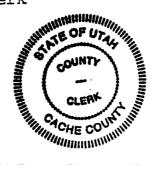
